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Admissions Policy

2 YEAR OLD ADMISSIONS

Children are admitted to our 2 year old provision as soon as is reasonably practicable after their 2nd birthday.

Your 2-year-old can get free early education and childcare if you live in England and get one of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Universal Credit
- tax credits and you have an annual income of under £16,190 before tax
- the guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- support through part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act
- the Working Tax Credit 4-week run on (the payment you get when you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)

A child can also get free early education and childcare if any of the following apply:

- they are looked after by a local council
- they have a current statement of special education needs (SEN) or an education, health and care (EHC) plan
- they get Disability Living Allowance
- they have left care under a special guardianship order, child arrangements order or adoption order.

When a child in our provision for 2 year-olds, turns 3, it is at the discretion of the school either that a child remains in that provision until the end of that academic year or is moved into Nursery as soon as a place becomes available Nursery.

NURSERY ENTITLEMENT

All three and four year children are entitled to 15 hours free Early Years education as from 2010.

















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NURSERY ADMISSIONS

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Children are admitted to Nursery the academic year following their 3rd birthday and, usually, as soon as reasonably practicable after their 3rd birthday.

Places will be allocated to children in the following priority order:

- 1. Children who have their 4th birthday between September 1st and 31st August of the academic year in which they are applying for a place.
- 2. Looked after children
- 3. Children with SEN as evidenced by a professional for example:
 - a. If they have a significant medical condition and the child's consultant states they must attend a specific nursery
 - b. Social reasons supported by a relevant professional for them to attend a specific nursery
 - c. Children in lone parent families who have no other local family support
- 4. Brothers and sisters already attending the school at the point of admittance. This does not include cousins living at the same address.
- 5. Other children

RECEPTION ADMISSIONS

All four year olds are entitled to a free early education place before they reach statutory school age (the beginning of the school term immediately following the child's fifth birthday.

Children are admitted into reception in the September of the school year in which they reach the age of five. However, parents may request that their child's entry to reception is deferred until later in the same school year. The admission criteria will apply to all children seeking a school place, whatever their term of entry. The place offered will be held on condition that it is taken up within the same school year. Children attending a school's nursery are not guaranteed a place in the reception class and a separate application must be made.

PUPILS WITH A STATEMENT OF SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

The admission of pupils with a statement of special educational needs is dealt with by a separate procedure. Such children will be admitted to the school named on the statement without reference to the oversubscription criteria below.

ADMISSION POLICIES

Where the number of preferences for a school exceeds the number of places available, priority will be given to children in the following categories:

- 1 Children in public care (looked after children)
 - 2 Sisters and brothers of children living at the same address, who are at present on roll at the school, and will still be attending the school at the time of admission (siblings)

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When demand exceeds places in any of the above criteria, the distance between home and school, measured by a straight line, from the main entrance of the home to the main entrance of the school building, will be used to decide who is given a place; those living nearest being given the available places. Children who are not successful in being allocated a place, will be placed on the waiting list.

NOTES

- 1. The terms "sisters" and "brothers" refers to children who live with the same family at the same address. Children living with the same family e.g. foster children and step-sisters and brothers are also included.
- 2. "Home address" refers to the pupil's permanent home at the date of admission. Where a child lives with parents with shared responsibility, it is for the parents to determine which address is to be used for the allocation process.
- "Nearest Church of England School" is measured by a straight line distance from the main entrance 1. of the home to the main entrance of the nearest Church of England primary school, including those in other local authorities.
- In each of the above admission policies, proximity to school is used as a tie-breaker, those living 2. closest being given priority. Where the offer of places to applicants with equi-distant addresses would lead to oversubscription, the decision of who will be offered the place will be made by random selection.
- Twins or triplets where a family of twins or triplets request admission and there is only one place 3. available, it will be for the family to decide whether or not to take up the place for one of their children and appeal for the second or third child in the same year group, or to decline the place.
- Pupils will not be admitted above the published admission number for the school unless: 6
 - exceptional circumstances apply as defined in the School Admissions Code,
 - where additional school places need to be provided, or
 - the pupil is admitted as part of the 'fair access protocol', agreed with all schools in the area. ٠
