<p>Physical health and wellbeing: What keeps me healthy?</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • about eating well • about the importance of physical activity, sleep and rest • about how germs are spread, how we can prevent them spreading and people who help us to stay healthy and well • Pupils know why toothbrushing, fluoride toothpaste, and dental check-ups matter, and how sugary food/drinks affect teeth. 	<p>Relationships and health education: Boys and girls, families</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • to understand and respect the differences and similarities between people • about growing from young to old and that they are growing and changing • that everybody needs to be cared for and ways in which they care for others • about different types of family and how their home-life is special • That families are important for children growing up because they can give love, security and stability • The characteristics of healthy family life, commitment to each other, including in times of difficulty, protection and care for children and other family members, the importance of spending time together and sharing each other's lives • That marriage represents a formal and legally recognised commitment of two people to each other which is intended to be lifelong • How to recognise if family relationships are making them feel unhappy or unsafe, and how to seek help or advice from others if needed • About the concept of privacy and the implications of it for both children and adults (including that it's not always right to keep secrets if they relate to being safe) 	<p>Keeping safe and managing risk: Indoors and outdoors</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • about keeping safe in the home, including fire safety • about keeping safe online, including the benefits of going online • That people sometimes behave differently online, including by pretending to be someone they're not • That the same principles apply to online relationships as to face-to-face relationships, including the importance of respect for others online (even when we're anonymous) • about keeping safe outside • about road safety

<p>Mental health and emotional wellbeing: Friendship</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • about the importance of special people in their lives • about making friends and who can help with friendships (on and offline) • about solving problems that might arise with friendships (on and offline) 		<p>Drug, alcohol and tobacco education: Medicines and me</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • why medicines are taken • where medicines come from • about keeping themselves safe around medicines • that medicines can be used to manage and treat medical conditions such as asthma, and that it is important to follow instructions for their use

<p>Physical health and wellbeing: In the media</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • that messages given on food adverts can be misleading • about role models • about how the media can manipulate images and that these images may not reflect reality • To recognise that social media platforms and online communities can sometimes reinforce extreme views and discourage dissent or debate (echo chambers). • How algorithms and online communities can influence the information and opinions they see online. • That some social media users may present exaggerated or idealised profiles, and to understand the impact this can have on self-esteem and expectations. 	<p>Keeping safe and managing risk: Making safer choices</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • how to keep safe when communicating with other people online • The rules and principles for keeping safe online, how to recognise risks, harmful content and contact, and how to report them • How to critically consider their online friendships and sources of information, including awareness of the risks associated with people they've never met • How information and data is shared and used online • Pupils learn about online scams and fraud (e.g., phishing emails, fake websites), how personal data can be misused, and how to report concerns • How websites and apps collect personal data for advertising purposes, what targeted advertising is, and how to manage privacy settings to protect their information. • What sorts of boundaries are appropriate in friendships with peers and others (including in a digital context) • How to respond safely and appropriately to adults they may encounter (in all contexts, including online) who they don't know • that violence within relationships is not acceptable 	<p>Mental health and emotional wellbeing: Dealing with feelings</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • about a wide range of emotions and feelings and how these are experienced in the body • about times of change and how this can make people feel • about the feelings associated with loss, grief and bereavement

<p>Identity, society and equality: Stereotypes, discrimination and prejudice</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • about stereotyping, including gender stereotyping • talk about the range of faiths and ethnicities in Britain; • explain how and why laws are made 		<p>Careers, financial capability and economic wellbeing: Borrowing and earning money</p> <p>Pupils learn:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • that money can be borrowed but there are risks associated with this • about enterprise • what influences people's decisions about careers
